<u>Treason</u>

Beautifully complimenting our Tudor History topic, Treason by Berlie Doherty provides an insight into Tudor life. Forced by his power-hungry aunt and uncle to leave his family home, Will Montague finds himself utterly overwhelmed working as a page to Prince Edward under the keen eye of the temperamental King Henry VIII, as prone to unexpected bursts of compassion as he is to brutal cruelty. Just as he begins to find his feet in this new position, Will finds himself suddenly on the run, desperately trying to clear his father, convicted of treason for failing to revert Protestantism, and simultaneously gaining more awareness of the world he lives in and the plights of the working class.

We have made predictions and comparisons, summarised, explored feelings and motives, considered viewpoints, described settings and characters and used a range of sentences to write diary entries and narratives.


<u>Maths</u>



This term in maths, we started by looking at the types of angles and then used known facts to calculate them round a point, on a line and in shapes.



We moved on to adding and subtracting decimals using, hundred squares, number lines, part-whole models, ten frames, bar models and column methods - remembering, of course, our place values!

Properties and changes of materials

This Science topic will carry over into next term, but so far we have considered the properties of materials and their fitness for purpose, experimented to discover which solids are insoluble or soluble, decided if changes are reversible or irreversible and practised filtering and sieving.









The Tudors

Leeds Castle was the perfect introduction to our History topic this term. Not only did we have fun, but learned so much about the English monarchy. Our enthusiastically performed workshop was full of lavish costumes, marriage, dramatic demise and babies.

Back in class, the children have impressed with their retained knowledge. We have become familiar with the Tudor timeline and family tree, found out how the Tudor line started with Henry VII at the Battle of Bosworth, studied Henry VIII and his six wives, gained an insight into the creation of the Church of England and looked in more detail at the reigns of Edward VI and Elizabeth I.

Creating Media was the ICT unit this term. We have considered what a video is, identified and practised using devices, investigated features of an effective video - including camera angles to create an illusion - and recorded our own videos.
