

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Dear Friends

I have just finished a training course about safeguarding. A subject guaranteed to get some pretty lively – and sometimes colourful – responses from people!

As a teacher, as well as taking different roles in the church, I have undergone a lot of training over the years, with certificates and DBS certificates enough to wallpaper a significant-sized room. I am also safeguarding lead in three of our parishes.

You may already have nodded off, but I am writing about this now because I believe passionately that safeguarding is an essential part of who we are and what we do. After all, shouldn't it be in our DNA as human beings to want to see others flourish and feel safe? That everyone should be able to live without fear? One of the most terrifying things that seems to jump out of the TV screen when there are news reports from conflict zones is thefear on the faces of the youngest and most elderly, those most vulnerable to the appalling effects of bombs and gunfire.

We don't need to protect those around us from such extreme violence, but the damage done to those who live with the fear of physical or sexual violence, or whose lives are minutely controlled by those who claim to love them and should have their best interests at heart, can be incalculable.

I was recently hearing tales of awful, casual brutality that happened at schools in the '60s and '70s, with staff ruling by terror and the threat of physical violence. And as a young woman growing up in the '70s, I am not the only one to have been affected by the casual assumption of older men that they could say and do things which would, thank heavens, be unacceptable today. Things weren't always better!

Progress is often hard won, and I am grateful that we now live in a society where, notionally at least, certain attitudes and behaviours are

no longer acceptable. But we are far from perfect, and there has been much which has left a legacy of suffering, both within the church and in wider society. That must be addressed, and we must be on the alert for that which still needs to be challenged. And that is why we need safeguarding training, and structures which seek to protect against wrong behaviours.

And it is why we need to be ready to be challenged, to be disturbed, and to stand up for those who are the most vulnerable and on the fringes of our communities. That's what Jesus did when he spoke to and healed lepers, when he ate with tax collectors, when he healed the woman who had suffered years of bleeding, when he sat alongside the woman caught in adultery. It's what Jesus did when he gathered children around him and spoke of how precious they are.

Jesus allowed those around him to be fully human, to know they were loved and not judged. And in the end, that's what safeguarding is all about. Active love.

A recent Moth survey found two rare, protected Moth species along the sea wall which is good news.

A young Nightingale and some young Little Owls have been spotted, no doubt there are many more youngsters about so please keep your dogs close and keep to the paths.

help in your own time by snipping back brambles and other overgrowth along the paths, the Brickie is mostly maintained by volunteers and we need all the help we can get!

LOWER HALSTOW PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

The Fiery Clearwing moth (photo on the front cover), which is a nationally rare moth, has been discovered at the seawall area of the Brickfields, where it is laying its eggs amongst the plants. The Parish Council have asked the Environment Agency not to cut the vegetation along the seawall until September, when the breeding season for this very rare and protected moth is over.

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LOWER HALSTOW PRIMARY SCHOOL

As we come to the end of another academic year, I can't believe how quickly it has passed and how much we have managed to fit in, it is so lovely to be back to normal now after Covid and to be able to enjoy our annual events, especially those where we can invite parents and the local community to join us.



This term Rowan Class (Year 1) headed out to Wingham Wildlife Park in the last class trip of the year, the weather was lovely and sunny and the children had great fun seeing all the animals.

We have been celebrating a few sporting successes this term too; our Year 5 and 6 boys' football team finished third in the league whilst our Federation Girls team (joint with Newington) finished in first place. We are very proud of them all for their teamwork and sportsmanship. The weather was kind to us and we managed to fit in our annual sports day which was won by Dover House this year. The children tried really hard in all the activities and supported each other brilliantly. One of the highlights was the sprint races at the end, with gold medals being awarded to the fastest girl and boy in each class.

Term 6 is an important term for our Year 6 pupils as they complete a number of activities to prepare them for secondary school and later life. They have completed two money and finance sessions delivered by The Family Trust, which aim to help the children understand basic budgeting, saving and spending. The children also had First Aid training to ensure that as they become more independent they are well equipped to face the wider world.

After SATS, our Year 6 pupils from both schools headed off on their residential trip to Kingswood; they took part in shelter building, fire making, Jacob's ladder, archery, climbing and problem solving to name just a few of the fun activities. Once they came back they went into full rehearsal mode for their end of Year 6 performance 'The Pirates of the Curry Bean'. It is an amusing tale of piracy, treasure hunting and a man returned to his family. The event was well attended and the audience were very impressed by the standard of the singing of all the children.

To ensure a smooth start to the new academic year in September, all children had the chance to meet their new teachers and teaching assistants and spent two mornings together completing activities and getting to know one another. Our Year 6 pupils also had the opportunity to spend some time in their new secondary school to help them familiarise themselves with the much larger buildings!

In preparation for our new pupils who will join us in September we have decorated our Year R classroom, had new wood effect lino laid as well as purchased new wooden furniture to complete the look. It is now a very inviting space which fosters learning and enquiry.

After the success and enjoyment of the event last year, we invited Scott Ryan in again. He is a specialist outdoor chef, who created some new dishes with the children: all cooked on an open fire. The dishes created were linked to periods in history that the children had studied throughout the year. This meant that the school grounds smelt lovely for several days but the best bit was eating their creations at the end!


Hopefully the glorious weather will continue and everyone can enjoy lots of lovely outdoor summer activities before the Autumn chill arrives and we are back in school once more.
