FLOOD WARDENS - FLOOD ALERTS

From the Lower Halstow Flood Wardens:

During the year we are contacted if there is a Flood Alert by the Environment Agency, which we of course take very seriously. There is a flood Village Flood Plan, which if there were to be a flood within Lower Halstow, and would be very quickly put into place, for the Villagers safety.

And we would like you also to be prepared too, should one occur:-

- 1. Move your family and animals into a higher place for their safety.
- 2. Businesses (like The Three Tuns and Shop) should inform staff and customers, ensure that they can get to safety and move stock to a safe place.
- 3. Move your car or other vehicles to higher ground, if it is safe to do.
- 4. Cover your property's air bricks.
- 5. Move important items upstairs, or to a safe place in your property, starting with cherished items of personal value that you will not be able to replace (such as family photographs), Next move valuables (such as computers), movable furniture and furnishings.
- 6. You may need to leave your property, so pack a bag with enough items for a few nights away, Include essential items including a torch with spare batteries, mobile phone and charger, warm clothes, home insurance information, water, food, first aid kit and any prescription medicines or baby care items you may need.
- 7. Turn off gas, electrical and water mains supplies before flood water starts to enter your property. Never touch an electrical switch if you are standing in water.
- 8. If it is safe to do so, make sure neighbours are aware of the situation and offer help to anyone who may need it.
- 9. Listen to the advice of the emergency service and be ready to evacuate your property if told to do so. Most evacuation centres (i.e. Lower Halstow Memorial Hall) will let you bring your pets.
- 10. Avoid walking, cycling or driving through flood water. 30cm of fast flowing water can move a car and 6inches can knock an adult off their feet.
- 11. Flood water is dangerous and may be polluted. Wash your hands thoroughly if you've been in contact

We would like to point out, that the Environment Agency spent an enormous amount of money only this year, helping Lower Halstow's sea wall to be safe from high tides, and the shoreline crumbling away. Please keep this section of Lower Halstow's Village News, as it helps you to know what to do, in case we are flooded, or even if your washing machine/dishwasher should floods, a lot of the above information applies.

And please do not be alarmed, we do have frequent flood warnings during the year, but thank goodness they are not all serious, but if we are flooded, you now have the knowledge to take steps in keeping you, yours families and neighbours safe, should their ever be a 'could be harmful to life and properties' flood.
