

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Dear friends

As I write, the sun is shining, the birds are singing, and the air is full of the sounds of lawn mowers, strimmers and power tools as people get out into the garden and start to get things ready for the coming warmer months.

Our gardens can be a real source of joy: a space where we can enjoy the fresh air, get our hands dirty and relax. There is masses of research and anecdotal evidence which supports what we probably all know – gardening, and being outside, are good for us. Gardening can increase our levels of physical activity, which is beneficial, and time in a green environment has been shown to reduce stress and improve wellbeing. Many of us are fortunate enough to have that outside space, living as we do in villages, or we have places nearby where we can enjoy the glories of creation.

A well-cared for garden, filled with plants, can be such a source of joy. Flowering plants bring colour and beauty, and growing vegetables and fruit can be hugely satisfying. But I believe we need to garden in harmony with nature, not in opposition to it.

I was really disturbed when I was at one of our local supermarkets the other day to see just one small shelf dedicated to products for those seeking to garden with respect for nature, while there were five shelves of packets and bottles containing substances promising to kill ants, slugs, snails, weeds, moss, and all manner of things. Do we really need to douse our gardens with what are, essentially, poisons? Why are we so obsessed with control and neatness?

There are many ways we can garden in harmony with nature, from planting for pollinators – the most obvious being honey bees, but there are many other insects which pollinate – to providing plants with seed heads for birds, water features which encourage all kinds of wildlife and companion planting, which establishes groups of plants that are beneficial to each other. A lovely example of this is planting nasturtiums

near brassicas – cabbage white butterflies will lay their eggs on the nasturtiums, rather than on your precious veg. And fennel attracts hoverflies, which prey on aphids. Garden to encourage hedgehogs – they love to feast on slugs and snails!

God created this beautiful planet of ours, and it is possible for us to coexist with all manner of creatures, and weeds, rather than simply controlling and destroying things that seem to us to be out of place. And if we spend less time wrestling with nature, maybe we can have a little more time to just 'be' in the natural world and appreciate its variety and complexity.

Enjoy the blessings of creation this spring! Rev Amanda

D-DAY 80 - THURSDAY 6 JUNE 2024

The 6th June 2024 marks the 80th anniversary of D-Day, when Allied forces mounted the largest amphibious invasion the world has ever witnessed. In 1944 Operation Overlord saw around 4,000 ships and landing craft set down about 132,500 troops on five Normandy beaches in an action that would bring about the liberation of north-west Europe from Nazi occupation.

The bravery and sacrifice of those people in securing the peace and freedom we enjoy today will be observed by the lighting of beacons around the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man and UK Overseas Territories.

The village is encouraged to join together as our Beacon at The Brickfields in Lower Halstow is lit at 9.15pm on 6 June 2024, to commemorate this momentous achievement.

From John Mustoo:

On 14 February 2024 we celebrated our 23rd anniversary. Over the years there have been a number of changes with people moving on. But we have been fortunate and replacements have come forward to ensure that the Club continues to flourish and has a strong core of village people. Initiated by John Mustoo, Chairman and John Rigby, Secretary. To generate a group of people with a vested interest of improving the hall facilities which at the time were somewhat run down. Over a period of 10 years each person paid £2 per session, of which £1.75 went to the hall funds. Attendance could vary from 6-16 which generated thousands of pounds over and above normal hire rates. Contributing to the hall efforts to raise funds for improvements. In 2012 the Club became independent and paid a regular users fee. For 2 years there were 2 teams in the Swale League using the hall on 110 occasions per year.

Swale Winter League - we had hopes of winning Division 3 but were piped at the post, 1 point behind the winners. This was under the new scoring system of 3 points for a win, 2 for a draw and 1 point for losing, irrespective if the is 6-0 or 4-2. This does truly reflect the endeavours of the losing side. We anticipate that coming second we will be promoted to Division 2. Bill Robinson and Joy Russel entered the Swale Pairs Competition loosing in the final to a very experienced team from Division 1.

We can still accept new players on Monday afternoons 2-4pm but have more capacity on Wednesdays 7.30-9.30pm. Look forward to seeing you. John Mustoo 843681

LOWER HALSTOW PRIMARY SCHOOL

The children of Lower Halstow School managed to squeeze a lot into the last few weeks of Term 4!

As well as the events detailed below we are very excited to now have an additional learning space which has been built, in the form of our new log



cabin, which we have fondly named 'The Lodge'. This extra space will be used for interventions, speech and language sessions as well as a quiet space for time out. The floor will be laid over Easter and the children are excited about heading in to see what it is like inside next term. Thanks to the money donated from the Scarecrow trail we have managed to purchase a range of furniture, beanbags and toadstool seats to make the Lodge an inviting space for everyone.

Science week was a real hit with everyone! A range of experiments took place in school with children choosing to do additional testing at home. One of the themes was adaptation; for this the children created specially adapted moths that camouflaged themselves in various places around the school.

We joined in with the national fundraising for Comic Relief; the School Council voted to wear non-uniform in order to raise money, several children also donned their red noses for the day. We raised £178.74 from the donations on the gate, which will go towards worthwhile causes in this country and abroad.

Year 4 also found time to head out on a trip to Kent Life for an Egyptian Experience, where they participated in a day of workshops focused on what life was like in Egyptian times. They learnt dances to perform to the Pharaoh, wrote healing spells to Sekhmet, built pyramids and learnt about how the Egyptians prepared for the journey to the afterlife – a great day was had by all!

Our term ended with a lovely Easter Service at St Margaret's Church led by John Guest. The children shared prayers and Bible readings, reading beautifully, but the highlight was definitely the singing of Spring Chicken which is always a popular request!

An annual tradition at the end of the term is for the children to have a visit from our very own Easter bunny, aka, Teddy the school dog in disguise. This year the real Easter bunny also accompanied him! The PTFA bought a chocolate egg, chick or bunny for every child. The children loved seeing Teddy dressed up and were pleased to receive their chocolate treat!

Year 3, Maple Class feature:

Maple Class has had a very busy term learning all about Roman Britain. We decided to use this as the focus for our class assembly. We created Roman shields and practised their fighting formations such as 'the tortoise' and 'the wedge'. It was clear to see why the Roman army was so successful! In art, we have studied how the sculptor Anthony Gormley uses concrete, iron, clay and wire to show the connection between humans and the space around them. We enjoyed creating our own representations of people using wire. Looking forward to next term, we are excited to be involved in a six-week local environmental project with Wild Estuary. We will be learning to recognise different plant and animal species native to our estuary and learning about the impacts of climate change and what can be done to protect the estuary and its wildlife.
