Are you an experienced driver with a clean driving licence? Are you available during school hours if given plenty of notice? Would you like to earn some extra money while helping to support the education of the children in the village?

The school need additional drivers to drive the school minibuses to trips out and are hoping to recruit local people to support them. If you have a people carrier or 4x4 then driving the new style of 'minibus lite' is very similar. Full training is provided along with a short practical assessment. This is a 30 minute accompanied drive to check that you are sufficiently confident – this is not a full driving test!

FOOD BANK DONATIONS

LOWER HALSTOW WALKERS

We have changed our name and are no longer part of the Health Walks programme. We are now Lower Halstow Walkers, and all are welcome. Starting at 10am every Monday, including Bank Holidays, from the end of Lapwing Drive, by the Brick Fields, and there will be two walks on offer; a brisk 2 hour walk and a one and a half/two hour walk at a more moderate pace (the slower walk will have opportunities for an earlier detour if the distance is longer than some walkers can manage). Walkers who want to go faster can, but will be asked to wait for the rest of the group at suitable points, as currently happens, this way we can be inclusive of everyone.

The first Monday of every month when we walk to the golf club we will still have two walks, one taking the shortest route possible, arriving first and therefore being served first. Sturdy walking shoes/boots and a waterproof jacket are recommended.

LOWER HALSTOW PRIMARY SCHOOL

The weather remained mild as we saw out the last part of October which meant that the children could still enjoy eating outside at the picnic tables and playing on the field before it got muddy after the torrential November rain. Fortunately, we have had a small area of eco draining artificial grass installed and a new soakaway created so that the children can use some of the field all year



round without having to wear wellies! This will definitely be put to good use.

Year 6 managed to pick one of the few wet September days for their visit to the Creed Adventure Centre in Teynham. This team building day

really put their resilience and perseverance to the test! They took part in a blind trail, archery, high ropes, low ropes, the climbing wall and survival skills. A great day was had by all and the rain eventually dried up by the afternoon, with everyone achieving something that pushed them out of their comfort zone.





As part of our Culture Month the whole school received a visit from an African Drumming group – the children were mesmerised by their performance and then had the opportunity to try out the drums in a special workshop for each class.

The Dogs Trust paid us a visit on the last day of term and led a whole school assembly all about being safe around dogs, the Key Stage 2 children then all received a workshop about dog safety, dog breeds and what the Dogs Trust does.

The PTA were very busy this term organising their annual Scarecrow Trail around the village, this was a real success, raising over £1000 (the final totals are still being counted). The school entry was Humpty Dumpty which was put together by Mrs Saxton and her team of helpers. Thank you to all the local residents who created a scarecrow or gave up their garden to host one, we really appreciate your support and have received comments from far and wide about how welcoming the village was to all the visitors.



Term 2 has already got off to a busy start: Year 3 had a special dinosaur workshop where they learnt about the different dinosaurs as well as identifying and classifying fossils, sketching and creating rubbings of fossils, not forgetting role-playing fossil formation! Meanwhile, Pat Wells and Kathryn Stuart, artists in residence with the Raybel Trust worked with the Year 5 and 6 pupils to create boat and plant based sculptures using recycled paper and cardboard; their creations were amazing.

November Class feature – Year 5 Beech Class
Beech class have had a fun start to the term as they took part in creative
workshops and challenges. For our paper sculpture workshop, we all
used recyclable goods that we brought in from home to create our own
sculptures that were inspired from a local artist who came in to visit us.
We were encouraged to create whatever sculpture we wanted and we
made a mixture of geometrical shapes, robots, memorials, boats and
flowers.

We recently took part in a Lego challenge alongside Year 5 children from Newington C of E School. We had so much fun! We used many scientific, technological and mathematical skills to design, budget for and create our own buildings. We are proud to share that a group from Lower Halstow won a bag of chocolates each for showing great dedication to their work, taking time to plan their work carefully and showing great teamwork. We can't wait for our next workshop this term where we will be taking part in a fashion design session.

Outside of school hours, many of us travelled around and explored the village to see all the different and interesting scarecrow creations. We all shared what we had seen with each other when back at school and

decided that all of them were our favourites. We are now all very excited and on the countdown until Father Christmas comes to visit us.

LOWER HALSTOW PARISH COUNCIL UPDATES Christmas Lights

The Christmas tree lights, on the green by the bus stop, will be turned on at 6.30pm on Saturday 3 December and there will be free mince pies.

Sea wall

Earlier this month the Parish Council received an email from the Environment Agency to say that work to repair the sea wall will not commence until next year. This was said to be due to outstanding archaeological and environmental assessments. Due to this

disappointing news and concerns that our sea wall could breach this winter, Cllr Portman has contacted our local Member of Parliament, Gordon Henderson. Mr Henderson's office has since confirmed that he has contacted the Environment Agency on behalf of the Parish Council and an update is awaited.

Roman Coin Find

A copper-alloy Roman Republican semunicia of anonymous issuer, dating to the period c217-215 BC (Reece Period 1) was found on Parish Council land known to be formed from material cleared from London in the Post-Medieval period after the Great Fire of 1666. The area 200m to the south-east of the find spot however is the location of a suspected Roman Villa. It is therefore unclear whether this coin is a genuine ancient loss relating to the nearby Roman site redeposited alongside other material from London or a more recent antiquarian loss. Republican period bronze coinage is extremely rare in Britain, with fewer than ten examples securely identified on the Portable Antiquities Scheme database. More information is available here: https://finds.org.uk/database/artefacts/record/id/969879

The coin is currently being held by the Finds Liaison Officer in Maidstone and we hope that she will be able to bring it along to a Parish Council meeting for people to see. It will eventually be displayed by the British Museum in London

Dog Waste Stations - Polite Notice

The Parish Council have installed several dog waste stations around our village, each one equipped with a supply of dog bags for emergencies and to prevent dog waste being left lying around which is unpleasant and unhygienic.

Most dog owners are responsible and clear up after their dog, taking a bag or two if needed from the dog stations, which is acceptable and what they were designed for. Unfortunately, in recent weeks it has been noted that on several occasions someone has been helping themselves to at least 40 bags at a time. This has occurred at the dog stations at Heron Close, more recently at Gibbs field and has resulted in some of the dog stations lying empty for several days despite regularly being refilled.

The person/s responsible for taking all the dog waste bags from their stations in one go are incredibly selfish and thoughtless. As a result the

Parish Council will continue to monitor this and keep all the dog stations under constant review.
