FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Dear friends

Rubbish – bins – litter. Three words guaranteed to get us going! Hopefully, by the time you read this, the challenges there have been with the new waste contractor will be ironed out, and we will be able to put our bins out week by week without too much thought of what's involved. But the reality is, we produce huge quantities of rubbish, and it needs to be dealt with somehow. No-one can fail to have noticed how much accumulates when the collections aren't working out as they did in the early days of the new contract locally.

I'm sure I'm not the only one saddened by the amount of litter along our roadsides, and I find myself wondering how there are those who seem not to have worked out that rubbish doesn't cease to exist once it's chucked out of the car window. It's unsightly, and frequently dangerous for wildlife.

However we dispose of it, we produce mountains of rubbish – some 335 million tonnes of it annually in the UK. And of course even the rubbish we put in our bins has a life beyond the collection. It has to be dealt with, and that is costly, both financially and environmentally.

A couple of years ago, I went to Egypt with my family, and we took the train from Cairo to Luxor. It was a fascinating journey, along the Nile valley, and the train line follows the Ibrahimiya Canal, built in the 19th century to aid with irrigation. Along the entire route, the banks of this canal were completely covered with rubbish, the result of dumping for many years in a country without our infrastructure for dealing with waste. It was truly shocking, but a reminder that waste doesn't just disappear when it is disposed of.

Rubbish in landfill produces carbon dioxide and methane, contributing to climate change, along with hazards of polluted land, bad odours and pests. Unsurprisingly, no-one wants landfill near their home, but we are running out of sites. Incineration is one solution, and the energy produced can be harnessed and used, although it also produces

harmful, toxic emissions. And of course, we are all keen to recycle as much as we can. But even that requires energy and resources.

But it would be much better if we produced less waste. We readily forget that the three Rs of waste are Reduce – Reuse – Recycle. Would it not be better to reduce the amount of waste we produce? To use less, to avoid those products labelled as ‘disposable’, and buy things to last. We can all make an effort to reduce and reuse, thus reducing our own impact in the production of waste.

We are all stewards of this beautiful creation which God has given into our care, and we may often feel there is little we can do in the face of so much damage. But if we seek to be more responsible as consumers, collectively we can make a difference.

This year marks the 75th Anniversary of The Friends of Kent Churches, a charity which exists purely to give financial support to all churches in Kent to preserve these buildings for future generations. 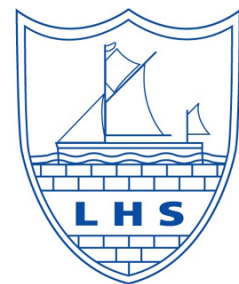

LOWERHALSTOW PRIMARY SCHOOL

As we come to the end of another academic year, I can't believe how quickly it has passed and how much we have managed to fit in. Although the Summer weather hasn't graced us with its presence fully yet we have still been lucky to get out and about, avoiding the rain.



Several classes have headed out for their last trip of this academic year. Rowan Class (Year 1) and Maple Class (Year 3) headed out to Tyland Barn. Both classes focused on different aspects including pond dipping and insect and plant identification. Meanwhile Willow Class (Year 2) headed off to Leeds Castle where they revisited the facts that they had

learnt about castles as well as spending time acting out a traditional tale in the castle setting. Good fun and memorable learning moments were had by all!

The weather was kind to us and we managed to fit in our annual sports day which was won by Leeds House this year. The children tried really hard in all the activities and supported each other brilliantly. One of the highlights was the sprint races at the end, with gold medals being awarded to the fastest girl and boy in each class.

We have also been celebrating a particular sporting success this term too with our Year 3 and 4 mixed cricket team getting through to the Kent finals! We didn't win the overall trophy however we were so proud of the children for getting that far in the competition, all the children that went showed amazing teamwork and sportsmanship.

The last special event that we had as part of Sports week was a visit from the Olympic athlete, Oakley Banks. He came into school and demonstrated some of his floor gymnastic moves to the whole school, including completing a back flip over Ms Brougham! He also worked with the children and got them completing circuit training to music. Everyone was really impressed by Oakley's skills.

Term 6 is an important term for our Year 6 pupils as they complete a number of activities to prepare them for secondary school and later life. They have completed money and finance sessions, which aim to help the children understand basic budgeting, saving and spending. The children also had First Aid training to ensure that as they become more independent they are well equipped to face the wider world. They are currently busy practising and preparing for their end of year production: 'Robin Hood and the Sherwood Hoodies'.

After SATS, our Year 6 pupils enjoyed a fun-packed activities week with trips to please every interest. The children had fun at Chessington World of Adventures and Soar trampolining, they also head off to Margate for a day at the Turner Contemporary Art Gallery, as well as fitting in eating chips on the beach. They also went to Riverside Country park for some

pond dipping and also Mote Park to have a go at the Ice Slide and the giant soft play area. Lots of memories were made as they prepare to leave primary school.

To ensure a smooth start to the new academic year in September, all children had the chance to meet their new teachers and teaching assistants and spent two mornings together completing activities and getting to know one another. Our Year 6 pupils also had the opportunity to spend some time in their new secondary school to help them familiarise themselves with the much larger buildings! Meanwhile, the PTFA hosted a coffee morning for the parents of the New Year R children, whilst the children had fun in Acorn Class, learning what it would be like to be in big school.

After the success and enjoyment of the event last year, we invited Scott Ryan in again for more outdoor cooking sessions, this has now become an annual event with the children looking forward to what new dishes they will make. Scott is a specialist outdoor chef, who creates dishes with the children: all cooked on an open fire. The dishes created were linked to periods in history that the children had studied throughout the year. This meant that the school grounds smelt lovely for several days but the best bit was eating their creations at the end!

Hopefully the sun will make more of an appearance ready for the August Summer holidays and everyone can enjoy lots of lovely outdoor summer activities before the weather turns more chilly as we head into Autumn.

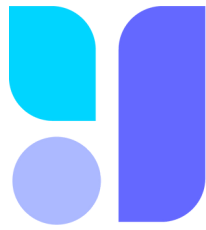
